KEY RESULTS FROM AJC'S STATE OF ANTISEMITISM IN AMERICA 2023 REPORT

The report is based on one of the largest-ever combined surveys of American Jews and the U.S. general public on antisemitism in America.



Over six in ten American Jews believe the status of Jews is less secure than a year ago.

1 in 4

American Jews were the personal target of antisemitism in the past 12 months. For American Jews under 30, this number jumps to 36%.

In the past year, almost half of American Jews reported changing their behavior at least once out of fear of antisemitism.

This number reflects an eight percentage point increase from 2022, when 38% of American Jews reported changing their behavior out of fear of antisemitism.



U.S. adults have personally seen or heard any antisemitic incidents, such as negative remarks or online content about Jewish people, or physical attacks on Jewish people or their religious facilities.

3 in **4** U.S. adults say antisemitism is a problem in the United States today.

In just one year, there has been a 12 percentage point increase in U.S. adults who say antisemitism is a "very serious" problem: 34% in 2023 versus 22% in 2022.

Americans, both Jews and non-Jews, believe antisemitism affects society as a whole; everyone is responsible for combating it.

The vast majority of Americans believe everyone is responsible for combating antisemitism.
